
A BALANCED JOB SEARCH


An effective job search is often a balanced job search. Implementing a variety of activities in your search for a new position can help you get hired faster.

Many jobs are never advertised publicly. They are filled by candidates who learn of them by word of mouth. Who do you know who can help lead you to your next job?



RECRUITERS/EMPLOYMENT AGENCIES


Recruiters and employment agencies actively seek out individuals to fill specific vacancies. Many colleges also have job placement offices. Would this be helpful in your job search?



DIRECT CONTACT/UNSOLICITED APPLICATIONS


Have a specific company you want to work for? Just because they aren't advertising an opening doesn't mean there isn't a job for you. Make a list of companies you want to work for and reach out.






APPLY FOR ADVERTISED OPENINGS


